The scenes from Morocco and Libya, coming on the heels of the devasting fires in Maui, have been a tragic reminder of the power of Mother Nature. Fortunately, members of the family of Lions have stepped up and are doing their best to help those who need it most. I have been asked about appeals for specific disasters, we tend not to do that and instead ask that donations be made to Disaster Relief. If appeals were issued for every event, sadly I would be contacting Clubs more frequently. Do not assume that LCIF is not responding because no major appeal has been launched, this is far from the case. Both Maui and Morocco have received initial grants of US \$10,000. Sadly, the situation in Libya is not so easy. The latest information I have is that LCIF is in contact with implementing partners regarding possible emergency projects. As there are no Lions Clubs in Libya, LCIF are unlikely to approve any grants direct. However, if Lions from other countries propose grants to serve this disaster, this will be evaluated by LCIF while maintaining the safety of the implementing Lions is maintained.

One of Mary's clients was, curiously, her husband who was president of Braniff Airlines. Braniff was one of the numerous airlines operating within the United States where, in a country where getting on a plane is as common as us getting on a bus, competition is fierce. Mary recognised that constant discounting of fares was potentially ruinous, particulatly where each competitor had the same selling proposition. What about Braniff could turn the selling proposition into a unique selling proposition?


What Mary devised is still talked about today (like here!). She convinced her husband that what he must do is paint each of the company's aircraft (she probably called them 'airplanes') a different pastel colour - pink, lilac, beige, coral, rose, etc, etc. And it worked. The unique selling proposition of having each airplane a different pastel colour worked. Passengers chose not the cheapest, they chose the prettiest and Braniff boomed.

This type of creativity could be defined as thinking the unthinkable and the example Mary set is still being pursued today with aircraft (or airplanes) now clothed in liveries that a couple of decades ago would have been unthinkable.

Creativity is often the ability to think the unthinkable. As unthinkable as raising funds by climbing the highest hill in Hampshire dressed as a mermaid!

Lion Stephen says: "The dedication of the volunteers who work tirelessly in their Lymington warehouse to make sure that every lorry load destined for Ukraine is full to bursting with essentials that we all take for granted here is incredibly humbling. It was both our honour and pleasure to spend the daye helping them with their amazing work."

There are collection points all over the New Forest for anyone who would like to donate items needed for aid centres and hospitals in Ukraine.

There are many opportunities for all the Lions Clubs in the area to help out in the same way.



Three Lions Clubs in north-east Hampshire (Aldershot, Fleet and Hart Lions) are launching a new fundraiser: The Lions Charity Advent Calendar.

"This is a new challenge for us," says one of the initiators, "And we really hope the public enjoy taking part and raising funds so we can help more local people. We really enjoyed working together on this though it was a bit of a test working with printers in Germany!"

The idea itself came the German Lions Club twinned with Farnham (SE). The Surrey Club are good chums with their near neighbours in SC who embraced the concept.

The calendars are on sale at £5 each and there are prizes to be won on every one of the calendar's days with a special prize of £250 on Christmas Eve. All together there is more than £3,500 worth of prizes to be won, thanks to the generosity of the local businesses in Aldershot and Fleet towards the project.

The Lions will be out selling the calendars on every Saturday until December in either Aldershot or Fleet shopping centres and supermarkets.

A 'Good News' story from Windsor Lions' April Prostate Cancer Screening Event



Usually a tale about someone having treatment for cancer would hardly be classed as a 'good news' story. But a local Windsor man, John Strange, was keen to acknowledge the part that the Lions Club of Windsor played in bringing his cancer journey to light – and

hopefully to a successful conclusion. Windsor Lions Prostate Cancer Screening Event was held in April at Windsor Racecourse and for John it triggered a series of events that resulted in the removal of his prostate and the cancer it was harbouring.

John emailed the event co-ordinator, Lion Diane Purchase, in June saying 'Can I say a big thank you for organising the prostate cancer event. I saw it advertised at Wexham Park Hospital and decided to book a place. My result was abnormal and I now have a positive diagnosis which can be easily rectified by surgery. Without your event I would be unaware of this so thank you so very much. I am now badgering people to get tested!'

Almost 1,100 men had a simple blood test at the event and around 70, including John, needed follow up investigations for possible prostate problems which might otherwise have gone undiagnosed.

John has recently reported again to Lion Diane. 'I have now had surgery and they have removed the prostate and hopefully all the cancer...Thanks again to you and the Lions as without your event it would still be silently growing inside of me'

Talking of the event Lion Diane Purchase commented: 'Stories like John's are why we are so passionate about this event. Uncovering just one case like this makes it all worthwhile and we are very grateful to John for sharing this powerful story and encouraging other men to get tested. We hope to stage another event in late 2024 or early 2025.'



Lions/Brain Tumour Research Appeal

In 2022/23 fourteen Clubs in our District have donated £8,884.59 to the appeal which has so far raised a quarter of a million pounds across the British Isles. There is still a long way to go to reach our target of £1 million, but plans are afoot from the new Multiple District Officer to have some large fundraisers.

If your Club would like to host an event, please let me know. There is a pop-up banner and leaflets available.

Another way of boosting the appeal is to donate via our District Treasurer, letting him know that the money donated is for Lions/Brain Tumour Research. Don't forget that 100 percent of donations goes on funding research and equipment with nothing taken off for admin.

The Value of Prostate Screening

In April this year, Loddon Valley Lions held a Prostate Screening Event for 200 men in their local community. Of these, ten tested red, indicating a strong likelihood of them having the disease. One of these was a member of the Loddon Valley Club who, sensibly, made speedy arrangements to visit his GP.

The GP could find nothing wrong with the Lion's prostate gland, but had another blood test carried out. This confirmed the result the Lion had received from the screening, so the GP had further tests carried out over time. These showed the condition was worsening, but as the GP could find nothing wrong with the prostate, the Lion was referred to hospital for scans.

The scans confirmed the GP's diagnosis that there was indeed no problem with the prostate, but did indicate the possible presence of a tumour in the bladder/kidney area. This was investigated by surgery and a tumour, subsequently found to be malignant, was removed. The Lion has now fully recovered from his operation and his surgeon is confident, subject to follow up checks, that the cancer has not spread.

Had this Lion not attended our screening, he would have been totally unaware of the problem, probably until it was too late and the cancer had spread to other parts of his body.

So, fellow Lions of the male variety, don't be



afraid, if you get the chance, take the test! As has been shown here, it can flag up other issues, which if tackled quickly, as in this case, could save your life.
